Guide for authors

As an international, multi-disciplinary, peer-refereed journal, Learning and Instruction provides a platform for the publication of the most advanced scientific research in the areas of learning, development, instruction and teaching. The journal welcomes original empirical investigations. The papers may represent a variety of theoretical perspectives and different methodological approaches. They may refer to any age level, from infants to adults and to a diversity of learning and instructional settings, from classroom to informal learning. They may rest on the full spectrum of established methodologies, from laboratory experiments to field observations. The major criteria in the review and the selection process concern the significance of the contribution to the area of learning and instruction.

Research article shall include a creative experimental research, survey research and theoretical research. In any cases, material to objectify the assertion shall be presented. Research article shall include following items

- A. Title, full name of authors (mentee only), school address, corresponding author's e-mail address
- B. Abstract
- C. Introduction
- D. Materials and Methods
- E. Results
- F. Discussion
- G. Conclusion
- H. Acknowledgements
- I. References

- II. Submission Regulation
  - It is the principle to submit research article to AMGS website;

  - 2. Submitted manuscript shall be written using MS-WORD 2007 version.
  - 3. The manuscript must be written in English.
  - 4. Follow the examples shown below for reference quotation
    - A. For 2 or less person: (Ausubel, 1998), (Park & Lee, 1998)
    - B. For 3 and above persons: (Ruthes et al., 2003)
    - C. For same author, same year with more than 2 articles: James Park (2000a, 2000b)
  - 5. List references in alphabetical order and follow the examples shown below.
    - A. For journal

# 6. Tables

- A. It is the principle to use only horizontal lines in table format.
- B. Place title and required description at the top of table.
- C. Use Arabic numbers for table title number. (E.g. Table 2)
- D. Tables should be clear and in complete form to enable publishing with reduced form.
- 7. Figures
  - A. Graph, drawing, picture are all referred as Figure.
  - B. Place title and required description at the bottom of figure.
  - C. Use Arabic numbers for figure title number. (E.g. Figure 1)
  - D. Figures should be clear and in completed form to enable to publish it with reduced form.
- 8. Edit the submission pages within 10 pages of A4 size.
  - A. Font Type: Times New Roman
  - B. Font Size: 12
  - C. Space between lines: 1.5
  - D. Volume: around 10 pages
- 9. Research article shall have Abstracts with 100~200 words.
  - A. Abstract shall list within 5 key words.

B. Authors may be asked by Editorial Committee about items not mentioned in this regulation.

## III. Caution

- The text of article shall be properly compressed into and shall include only the essential contents. It is strongly recommended to make brief description on the research purpose, problems, restrictions and terms definition at the introduction or at corresponding items instead of listing those items as separate sheet.
- Tables or figures play supplementary role for main contents, and they shall not be presented without explanation in the main contents.
   Tables or figures shall be concise as much as possible, and shall avoid to present complex diagram.
- 3. Applicant shall maintain copy of submitted file since the file sent through email is not to be returned.
